NKS embarked on the new financial year (2018/19) with many challenges as well as opportunities that saw significant changes to the way the organisation operates. NKS widened its scope by changing the name of the organisation. We are now called; Networking Key Services (NKS) Ltd which means that we work for all; men, women and children. The name change was agreed by relevant stakeholders during the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the organisation in November 2018 and a resolution for this was passed by the NKS Management Committee in February 2019.

NKS as an established platform engaged with ethnic minority communities; mainly South Asians to bring awareness and education to the community to enable them to make better choices in life. All of our projects/programmes are community-led. The Self Management of Long-term Health Conditions Project, Carer's Project, Empowering Women Initiative through cultural bridging, Low Carbon Communities Initiative and Digital Literacy Project were some of the programmes that the local communities benefitted from. The NKS pre-school nursery, After School/Homework Club for school going children and extra study support are some of the services that were offered to children and young people that have had positive impact overall for them. English as a second language (ESoL) sessions, in conjunction with Edinburgh College, twice a week have proved to be a confidence building tool for grass root women who have always felt isolated due to the language barrier. Lunch club for older people; men and women has enabled us to address the issue of loneliness and isolation to some degree.

Currently, NKS is also engaged in screening and raising awareness of malnutrition among older people that further brings on board several issues such as, the importance of a healthy diet and issues of food poverty among older people. Overall, NKS engaged with over 600 people in 2018/19 that included big events (annual general meeting and community gathering event in June 2018).

The projects that ran last year in collaboration with the local communities:

Low Carbon Communities Initiative (LCCI)

As part of the LCCI NKS engaged with South Asians in Edinburgh to develop sustainable wide range of activities that help to change behaviours to reduce CO2 emissions produced by them in their day to day life. Over 400 men, women and children have participated in the project activities last year. A number of upskilling and changed behaviour activities were facilitated i.e. cycling, arts & crafts, gardening, recycling and reducing food waste by reusing left over food.

A total of 20 women received one to one support to learn cycling that has had positive outcome where women were encouraged to cycle in their day to day life. Over 50 Women and children worked in collaboration with the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh (RBGE) to develop a gardening project that helped to enhance people's skills and encouraged families to grow their own herbs and vegetables. The swap shops organised by NKS were very popular with women and were well attended. These helped to reduce things going in to landfill. A total of 200 women and children attended swap shops at NKS last year. Energy advice and information was offered to over 40 families.

Empowering Women Initiative (EWI)

Collaborating with ten local community or-

ganisations in Edinburgh and introducing Asian women to the services of other local community organisations was well received by both parties. The EWI entailed exchange visits with local community projects and created opportunities for over 100 women from diverse cultures to get together on one platform. The sustainable community cohesion process started by NKS is benefiting the local communities and is helping to celebrate diversity in Edinburgh.

Health Education and Healthier lifestyle

A number of health education sessions relevant to different age groups were held for 150 women and 40 men; bowel cancer, prostate cancer, kidney diseases, breast cancer, first aid, Dementia Awareness, Alzheimer's disease and diabetes along with healthy eating. The sessions proved to be very informative.

The walk and cookery sessions held with the RBGE using local produce, engaged and encouraged communities to adapt to a healthier lifestyle. The feedback obtained was extremely positive where the participants strongly felt the need to continue the healthier lifestyle programme as it encourages them to sustain the habits formed by being part of the sessions and helps to address the issues of health inequalities.


Carer's Project





NKS successfully engaged over 25 female carers last year and gave them many opportunities to voice their opinions about the services for carers in group advocacy sessions. A number of female carers were identified through outreach work in the South Asian communities and encouraged to participate in community activities. One to one support is offered to the carers in line with their needs, and the individuals they care for are referred to the SMP at NKS.

Self Management of Long Term Health Conditions (SMP)



As other years, NKS reached out to families in the South Asian communities to people suffering from long term health conditions and provided one to one support to them. A total of 30 families were identified that were isolated and had very little information about the help and support they could receive. NKS worked with a number of health professionals and other agencies and offered support to individuals with health conditions and their carers. Families were provided with a platform where they could share information to increase their social networks. The NKS family support worker supported the families with issues of income maximisation and community workers helped them to access services relevant to their needs. Self -management is encouraged actively among individuals with long term health conditions to reduce dependence on health professionals.



Family Support Work

In addition to providing support to individuals with long term health conditions, the worker also reached out to families experiencing deprivation and felt excluded due to the lack of information and language barrier. Poverty, inadequate housing, inadequate information about services and their rights in general resulted in marginalisation and exclusion for them. To address issues for them, NKS conducted outreach work to identify such families and empowered them with information and knowledge along with the practical support to access services in Edinburgh.

Groups at NKS

Last year, 8 groups ran on a weekly basis at NKS which included women's groups, mother and toddler group, ESoL classes, lunch club for older people and men's support group. Over 200 people attended group activities last year. The men's support group at NKS is developing fast with many South Asian men showing huge interest in attending the group. They feel a huge gap for them as older men in social networking. The group sessions give them a chance to meet each other and reduce isolation and loneliness so widespread among them. A range of community engagement activities are facilitated in groups that help build capacity in the grass root communities. Over 100 people participate in group activities every week leading to increased social bonding.

Computer Classes

With a small funding from the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations, NKS ran basic computer classes for women who have little access to digital technology and are missing out on information due to the lack of digital skills. A total of 50 women attended the sessions. The women enjoyed learning about computers and surfing various information websites on the internet.

Pre-school Children

The full-time NKS Nursery is well utilised by the local communities. Last year 45 children used childcare services. The NKS Nursery offers cultural and religious sensitive services where many communities feel comfortable as their children's needs are catered for. Childcare is an integral part of the services offered to women. The service is also used as a crèche too.

After School/Homework Club (ASHC)

The ASHC caters for school going children offering extra study support out of school hours. Younger children were supervised with their school work and older children received extra study support in English and Maths. The feedback obtained was very positive where parents have informed us that children have achieved better grades with the support received.

In summary, NKS is one of the leading community organisations working closely with grass root communities experiencing multiple deprivations, to improve their quality of life and enable them to make better life choices. Among many challenges faced by the organisation, the financial challenge is a serious constraining factor posing a threat to the quality services offered to the grassroots in the ethnic minority communities. There is a pressing need to address these financial issues that subsequently result in shaky foundations for the organisation that are needed most to combat isolation and deprivation in the marginalised communities.

The environment NKS operates in has remained challenging during 2018/19. Demand for the type of services that NKS provides are growing but funding from traditional sources such as the Council and NHS have become increasingly constrained. NKS has however, been successful in gaining funding from alternative funding providers for new services and activities that support NKS' core aims and objectives. NKS has also continued to make up for the reduction in the funding of core services through surpluses generated in fund raising and fee generating activities.

Despite this difficult environment and significantly as a consequence of the fantastic commitment and dedication of NKS staff, NKS has continued to sustain service delivery and a high quality standard in a comprehensive and growing range of services with new funding streams being accessed and new services being delivered.

The key financial indicators for 2018/19 are as follows:

Total income for the year - £287k, an increase on the previous year's income of almost 27%.

Year End Reserves - Total Reserve Fund balances have increased from £59k to £65k. Restricted funds have increased from £6k to £8k and unrestricted funds have increased from £52k to £57k.

It is important to note that it remains essential that NKS retains a reasonable level of unrestricted reserves to support continued service delivery over the coming years and as a contingency in the event of unanticipated difficulties. As such we are aiming for a reserve of approximately 3 months operating costs (approximately £67k) and the good performance in the current year makes positive progress towards this target.

In summary, NKS has continued to perform well, to manage budgets well and has the strength to face the financial challenges ahead.
